A few weeks in so I'm getting used to it
Went into hibernation
Back alive now
Resurfacing
Things have been so crazy
Turned on its head
Settled but still gonna be weird
A weird time to be a student and an artist
All the kids I teach
What an interruption to education
In person interaction missing it
Crazy energy of classroom
Mid to late Fall
Consensus artists feeling squeezed in greater Boston and Boston area
What did you see from your end?
Closure of Green St affected everyone
Personally, I have always been at The Dance Complex
Immediate circle, sucks that it's closing
I have extensive background in arts admin
Used to work there at The Dance Complex
I know its not know it works
We have an ecology of dance
The way the pieces fit together make the craft sustainable or not sustainable
With the closure, it made it nearly impossible to get rehearsal time at The Dance Complex
Impossible to be a dancer in Boston and not feel the hit from Green St closing
Green St was a home for hip hop

Ashton Stackz kicked out of where he was at
Green St closed
MIT closed its doors
Hip hop community predominately people of color
Ripples it was creating
Hard as a white modern dancer
How much harder it is when you are in much more marginalized forms of dance like hip hop
Boston is super white
Sheds light on privilege in a real way
Who within the arts manages to survive with support
And who doesn't
Were you involved in any city meetings?
Or the walk around Green Street?
Cambridge arts council meeting
I did go to one forum at Green Street before it closed
Good insight from others
Activist from cyclist community
How they organized for biker advocacy
Interesting being a passive observer
It affects me differently without a brick and mortar place
Heard a lot about what's going on with city gov
Problem with gentrification pushing out art
What public sees isn't what it really is
A lot more nuanced than what it is
People aren't sitting in those rooms
Conversations coming to light
Crisis for years
Whether Cambridge will listen or not
Meetings have been happening for years
To make sure that The Dance Complex is in the ecology of Boston dance
Gov has so much power
People with money have so much money

How are you being affected?
It sucks for people like us
I do four things in dance
I make dance, I perform dance, I teach dance and I produce dance
Hit on artistry, hit on money
Losing rehearsal money as well
Double hit
Really good for my yoga practice
Very grounding for me
Otherwise it sucks haha
For teaching lucky to still have teaching income for all 3 places
Teaching switched to virtual classes
I'm paying for my own Zoom, my internet
Lucky I have an income
Also had to shell out a lot more money to keep that income
Affected my ability and desire to create
Haven't been feeling very inspired
Producer biggest effect and lump sum of money lost
Little gigs building up to biggest event
"That's what she said" event
Was going to be third and final year
The event this year got cancelled 45 minutes before curtains opened
On opening night
What?
Boston Center for the Arts, March 12th
In constant contact
Thought show was to run through the weekend
Payed for all production week and programs
Show supposed to be at 7:30
Last minute decision at 6:45 to close building and kick everyone out
One of the worst experiences I have ever had as an artist
Lost \$4,200 of ticket sales

Had to refund
Show cost \$10,000 to put on
And ethically still need to pay the artists
Don't know how to do it
Snapped away from us right at the last minute
I don't know why that happened if everyone was in the building anyway
It was not fun
Very valid so sorry that happened
How are you as an artist moving forward?
Teaching online
Bigger projects helping me stay motivated
Admin associate for Peter Dimuro who runs The Dance Complex
Work for Public Displays of Motion modern movement company
Fortunate to get NEFA creative city grant
New project "Stones to Rainbows, Gay to Queer Lives"
Based on concept of connecting young queer people to older gay people
Big age divide in LGBTQIA+ community
Dialogue based performance project
Interviews and workshops
Project transitioned online
Intergenerational cross sectional dialogues
Internet as new world
Originally all Boston based
Now world wide which is really cool
Collab LadyBos Productions with Russ Condon to create small artist relief fund
Create a visual album, singers create songs, dancers respond to those songs
People who tune in will donate to relief fund
Artists will have some money
People who are not fitting into relief fund boxes
Trying to help
Feeling motivated and excited
Good for morale

This project sparks something

Hard to feel purposeful in a world that's frozen

Glad that we created it for ourselves

Awesome that you are using online to your benefit now

I knew deep down that people like you were trying their best to make a positive impact

Helping others and creating projects to help spread the art word virtually

It's good to know that you can't ever really kill art. It will always find a way.
